## Hollywood Park Neighborhood Association Board Updates

#### Neighborhood Sign

The neighborhood sign project is moving along, albeit more slowly than initially planned. The HPNA continues to work with artist Casey Marshall, City Councilmember Jay Schenirer's office, and the city's planning office to gain the necessary permits to begin installation before the end of 2016.

#### 24th Street and Fruitridge Road 7-Eleven

At its August board meeting, the HPNA board voted to support the proposed 24 hour 7-Eleven gas station at the northeast corner of 24thStreet and Fruitridge Road. The new store will be a welcome replacement to the current blighted former tire store that has sat vacant at that corner for several years. The HPNA is additionally recommending changes to make the project more pedestrian and bike friendly.

#### **Proposed Capitol Nursery Raley's**

At its September 12th meeting, the HPNA board will discuss the contents of a new comment letter on the draft Environmental Impact Report for the proposed Land Park Commercial

Center, the future home of a new Raley's supermarket. Previously, the HPNA board submitted a letter and testimony to the City of Sacramento's Planning Commission requesting that the buildings along Freeport Blvd. and Wentworth Way be re-oriented to face the street to more effectively engage the neighborhood and that the current Raley's sign be moved to the new location. #### **Proposed 2017 Newsletter and Membership Fee Changes**

In an effort to sustain HPNA activities under increasing financial constraints, at its August meeting, the HPNA board voted to reduce the newsletter from four issues per year to two and to increase the membership fees by a to-be-determined amount. If revenue is available, additional newsletters would be delivered. The changes would be effective for 2017. Potential member fee levels are scheduled to be discussed at the September 12th board meeting.

When we cut back on watering our lawns last year due to the drought, some people didn't realize their trees still needed to be watered. Remember to water at the drip line, not at the trunk. The drip line is the outer most edge of the tree canopy.

Autumn is the best time of year to plant shade trees and you can get them free from SMUD. The easiest way to get them is to contact Sacramento Tree Foundation: sactree.com or (916)924-8733. Many of our neighbors are choosing to eliminate their lawns and plant water wise landscape plants, which hopefully include some shade trees. Once established, there are many beautiful shade trees that can enhance your new landscape, keep your home cooler and increase the value of your home.



### A Brief History of Hollywood Park

C acramento's Hollywood Park neighborhood is framed On the north by Sutterville Road, on the south by Fruitridge Road, on the east by 24th Street, and the west by Freeport Boulevard. Plot maps of the area reveal that developers, clearly recognizing its profit potential as the city of Sacramento rapidly expanded southward, had already gobbled up most of the land and divided it into parcels by at least the early 1900s.

Large-scale construction on the land did not begin until the late 1930s. One of the major builders in this initial phase was Parsons and Jacobs, who advertised that they



After the end of World War II, a massive demand for housing was created by thousands of returning soldiers armed with G.I. benefits and eager to start a family. Rushing to meet this demand was Sierra Builders, owned by John Fernandez, who constructed 128 new homes in the late 1940s. Fernandez called his development "Hollywood Park View."

Unlike the earlier homes designed by Parsons and Jacobs, Hollywood Park View was not built with variety in mind. Instead, most of this ranch-style tract housing was nearly identical and intended to be constructed in an efficient, cost-effective manner. Fernandez aggressively targeted veterans in his marketing campaigns. The ad-

vertising for his homes touted affordability and features considered luxuries at the time, such as dishwashers and wall-type furnaces.

Families moved to Hollywood Park in droves in the early 1950s. some before their driveway had even been poured. With the exception of a few wealthy residents, such as beauty school owner James Federico, most of the population was decidedly middle class. The homes on Shielah Way, for example, were occupied by a teacher, two restaurant owners, a dentist, a sales manager at Kraft Foods. and a telephone operator, among others. Meanwhile, on Stacia Way, actor Sam Elliott spent his early years in a home owned by his physical training instructor mother and a father who worked for the Department of the Interior.

Hollywood Park was the epitome of an all-American post-war neighborhood. Lemonade stands were commonplace. Kids played outside until dark, when their mothers called them home from the porch. Men discussed current events and told war stories over the

hedge. Doors were left unlocked at night without fear of theft or vandalism.

Many streets had their own traditions, events, and social activities. On Haldis Way, for example, barbeques and cocktail parties were commonplace, and some of the parents belonged to a local square dancing club. On Shielah Way, about a dozen families participated in the annual Easter egg hunt. Throughout Hollywood Park, most homes were decorated for Christmas, and neighbors gathered to celebrate the 4th of July together.

Local businesses were an integral part of the fabric and

culture of the neighborhood. Ott's Ice Cream, which was located at the corner of Freeport and Irvin, gave free ice cream cones to students who earned at least three A's on their report card. Hollywood Park resident E.P. Lawrence's Variety Store, located nearby, held yo-yo contests and hula hoop competitions for neighborhood children.

In 1959 Lawrence opened the 18,000 square foot Lawrence's Department Store, further north on Freeport, in the brand new Hollywood Plaza Shopping Center. Lawrence's sold high-end clothing, housewares, toys, and other goods, and became the shopping destination for local residents and those from the surrounding suburbs.

By the late 1960s, new construction in the area was complete and development had moved southwest to South Land Park, Greenhaven, and the Pocket. Over the next two and a half decades, Hollywood Park saw a bit of decline as some moved to the new suburbs and many original residents who remained were now too old to maintain their properties.



Throughout the late '90s and early 2000s, Hollywood Park experienced a renaissance of sorts as many homes were remodeled or restored, and young families were once again attracted to the area not only by the affordability and location, but the tradition of community as well. This new generation has started several of



their own traditions, including a popular 4th of July parade, and an annual community garage sale that attracts hundreds.

In 2010, Hollywood Park was voted "Best Neighborhood" by the Sacramento News and Review. Home values in the area are swiftly recovering from the recent recession, and new listings have been known to sell after just a few days on the market. Hollywood Park is as popular as ever – because as much as the region around it has grown and evolved, Hollywood Park has always stayed the same. Just the way the people like it.

## Hollywood Park Elementary School Update






