

Garden Light By Valeriejeanne Anderson


My spring bulbs are already up, and camellia buds are fattening for full flower. But just when I decided winter was not returning, here it comes. Cold winds are bringing down the fall leaves, and the compost pile is growing. Good, as I need more compost to protect the soil around tender plants from chills. It is also easier to do the heavy garden work when it is cooler. I think it is Mother Nature's way of encouraging us to assist her through the winter. Still I wonder, will the confused spring bulbs flower in spring?

The lawn has its winter feeding, waiting for the rains to work those nutrients into the soil. The last of the spring bulbs are in the ground, the summer corms lifted and stored for next spring and the watering controls are reset for winter. The seedlings for winter vegetables are ready to transplant into the garden. I do hope I can keep the snails away long enough to harvest home-grown lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower and chard. We shall see how leftover beer works. I was unsuccessful in getting the almonds and pecans from my trees before the squirrels. Impatient little critters do not even wait for maturity; just munch them off while still green.

It is time to finish pruning fruit trees and working the beds up to add manure and wait for spring. If you had leaf curl on your pitted fruit trees last year, spray with lime sulfur or fixed copper spray. Sprays absorb best right after a rainfall. These jobs keep them warm in the morning chill, and pay off next spring when our gardens are easy to work and our fruit trees are filled with fruit. While trimming, think about winter decorations. Use vine trimmings as a base for wreaths, bows for swags on the porch, and sticks as markers in the garden or an impromptu trellis.

After cleanup, look around for areas that can use temporary spring color — especially from a window on a rainy day. That is a perfect spot for wildflower seed. We all can use a bright unexpected spot of color in the spring. Rake the soil loose and sprinkle seed over the area. The rains will do the rest in the best outcome, or you may need to assist the spot with a sprinkle of water or two until the seeds sprout. I love wildflower seed, as we never know what will come up — it is like Mother Nature's grab-bag. I am still annually replanting Gloriosa Daisy from a packet eight years ago.

Check the websites for Spay and Neuter Days along with Trap and Release Programs. Although we love them, we don't want kittens in the spring. There are too many that die everyday at our shelters.

Also, we have had some lost dogs in the neighborhood lately, all of which had no identification. Some unfortunate news is that another cat was killed on Irvin Way by two of them. PLEASE get your dogs/cats collars and tags and use them! Consider getting us chipped! A chip will cost about \$35 and ensures our best chance to return home! Ask your vet. We deserve it.

Join us in making good things happen within our community!



Have you had your chimney & fireplace inspected?

The cold fall and winter temperatures are upon us. Folks throughout Hollywood Park have already begun grabbing extra blankets and turning up the heat in their homes to stay cozy this season.

For some residents this means increasing the temperature setting on the thermostat. Others stay warm by burning firewood – smelled throughout Hollywood Park.

Certainly, these cold months can be dangerous, even deadly, if folks do not properly maintain their wood and gas-burning chimneys.

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel-fired appliances as primary heat sources in their homes. The numbers are higher in our immediate area given that many houses built in our neighborhood, including Curtis Park, Land Park, and South Land

Park, have wood-burning chimneys.

"Every year fire crews respond to house fires in our community that take place due to a lack of fireplace maintenance," warned Niko King, Sacramento Fire Department assistant chief. "These fires often cause property damage and put lives at risk. With appropriate annual cleaning and maintenance of chimneys, these risks can easily be reduced," says King.

Staying safe this winter means taking the right approach in terms of heating maintenance. According to the National Fire Protection Association, heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths. Almost half of home heating equipment fires are reported during the months of December, January, and February.

Often these fires are due to creosote buildup in chimneys and stovepipes. All home heating systems require regular maintenance to function safely and efficiently.

Here are simple steps that can prevent most heating-related fires:

- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional. Find a chimney sweep that is certified by either the National Chimney Sweep Guild, www.ncsg.org, or the Chimney Safety Institute of America, www.csia.org.
- Make sure your gas burning appliances, such as gas fireplace and heaters, are in good shape and burn clean. Carbon Monoxide, caused by poor burning conditions can easily kill you! If you think any of your gas burning appliances are not working right, contact PG&E and they will send someone out to check it.
- Leave glass doors open while burning a fire because it ensures that the fire receives enough air for complete combustion and keeps creosote from building up in the chimney.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container, which should be kept a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly. (Just a reminder that "fall back" time change is a good time to change your smoke detector batteries).

If you smell natural gas, leave the area immediately and then call 9-1-1 and PG&E at 1-800-743-5000.


Rumor has it: Raley's will build a new store on the Capitol Nursery lot. What will happen to the current store....?


