We also want to thank the neighbors who had the mistletoe pruned out of their Modesto ash trees this winter.


It does help to keep the trees healthy and provide the much appreciated shade on our streets and sidewalks.

The Florence Way Project: Discovering Hollywood Park History The Dream House on Irvin Way

Frank and Stella are living in someone else's dream. Whether they're out doing yard work or on an evening stroll around the neighborhood, strangers often remind them. Heck, a few visitors have even knocked on their door to tell them their surroundings are not what they seem.

Not to worry, though. The couple isn't crazy, or hallucinating, and this isn't the plot of some Keanu Reeves sci-fi flick. Frank and Stella are quite normal and enjoy meeting their neighbors. You see, it's their house that came from an alternate universe in a Hollywood script.

The home, at the corner of Irvin and Helen way, is just that to-day—a home. But it was originally conceived and built as part of an innovative nationwide publicity campaign for the 1948 comedy "Mr. Blandings Builds His Dream House", starring Cary Grant and Myrna Loy.

In the film, Advertising Executive George Blandings (Grant) yearns to escape with his family from the literal and spiritual confines of a cramped Manhattan apartment to a dilapidated fixer-upper in the Connecticut countryside. When the existing home cannot be salvaged, Blandings and his wife Muriel (Loy), decide to build a new house and take a little too much control over the design process—resulting in hilarious chaos.

The story of the Blandings' pursuit of the "American Dream" came during an era of post-war prosperity in America, when millions of ex-GIs and their young families were leaving crowded cities for sparkling new suburbs like Hollywood Park. Americans weren't just looking for a change of scenery during this time, their taste in movies was changing as well. According to film historian James Harvey in a 2007 Toledo Blade article, the gloomy "film noir" style popular during the war had now given way to lighter fare; Reflecting national optimism and a desire to return to normalcy.

With a script to appease the prevailing trends and an A-list cast,

RKO Pictures President David O. Selznick and his Director of Publicity, Paul MacNamara, cooked up a unique way to promote their future blockbuster: According to Christopher Borrelli in the Blade article, their goal was to build exact replicas of the Blandings' dream house in the top 100 movie markets (in the end, 73 were actually built) across the country. Blueprints were drawn-up and sent to developers in each city. There was one major problem with those blueprints. They were plans for the movie set and only depicted what was shown onscreen. There was no stairwell to the second floor windows and closets were omitted, and some rooms were missing entirely. Local developers had to use creative license to fill in the blanks. In Sacramento, that job went to McMahon & Ford, one of a handful of developers capitalizing on the post-war housing boomwho were building shotgun tracts of houses in the new Hollywood Park development and elsewhere in the rapidly-expanding south







area. In the advertisements for their homes, McMahon & Ford aggressively solicited ex-GIs with housing benefits.

They did not forget their target demographic when planning Sacramento's version of the Dream House. In a stroke of marketing genius, McMahon & Ford clearly recognized an opportunity to promote their own product in addition to the film. Instead of attempting to duplicate the two-story behemoth depicted in the movie, they worked with architects Barovetto and Thomas—later known for their work on the Sacramento Community Center, American River College, and the UC Davis Medical Center—to come up with a design heavily inspired by Blandings' colonial-style digs, yet built on the sensible scale of homes under construction en masse in the area. This interpretation sent a strong message to potential buyers: Live your own dream - right here in Hollywood Park! While the house would not be an exact replica of the original, it would still closely approximate the look and feel of its namesake. The exterior was to feature a high-pitched roof, prominent chimney, and black storm shutters. The interior would include hardwood beams and flooring, a replica of the Blandings' signature fireplace, and a smaller version of the wall clock seen in their living room, among other elements. Even today, with the current owner's modern furniture in place, the living and dining rooms are still incredibly familiar to those who have seen the film. By the time the 1800 square foot, 6 room Sacramento Dream House was complete, nineteen local firms had participated in its development and construction. Breuner's furnished the interior with classic, provincial-style furniture, while the kitchen was fully-equipped with the latest appliances by General Electric. The flawlessly manicured yards were landscaped by Capital Nursery, and a brand new 1949 Ford sat in the driveway—courtesy of Ellsworth Harrold Company (known today as Harrold Ford). When it was opened to the public at noon on July 31st, 1948, visitors flocked to the Dream House in droves. Over 6,500 passed through its doors during the first week alone, and by the time it closed a month later, over 30,000 people had come to see the home that Blandings built. A rumor has long persisted that Grant and Loy themselves made an appearance at one point, but no official account has been found to corroborate this claim.

About two weeks into the grand opening, MacBride Reality listed the home for sale at the hefty price of \$25,000—more than 3 times the average cost of most homes in Hollywood Park at the time. Though the identity of the first, deep-pocketed owner of the home is unclear, records seem to indicate that the Montgomery Ward department store chain purchased the home for use as corporate housing. According to the city directory, the first two consecutive occupants of the home were General Managers at the store at 9th & K street. Both moved out within a year or so. The home has only seen a handful of owners since then. One of the earliest was Dr. Virgil E. Comstock, who was a flight instructor and B-17 pilot during World War II. The longest tenured and most prominent owners were John A. "Smilin' Jack" and Alberta Stassi, who owned the home from 1963 until his death in 2006. Mr. Stassi was a decorated war hero, highly

successful insurance man, active in local and state politics, and one-time Chairman of the Miss Sacramento beauty pageant. The Stassi's were also tireless advocates for the mentally disabled. When Frank and Stella movedin in 2014, they found the home in excellent condition. While there are always minor repairs to be done on older homes, they have yet to encounter any serious issues with this one. In fact, Frank says, they have found it to be more reliable than the newer homes they have owned. The Dream House was very well built. Some of the owners have contributed their own improvements to the home over the years—adding almost 700 square feet to the original layout. Several years ago a real estate office was built onto the back, which is now split into two separate rooms. A wall was erected beyond that, as there was originally no fence on the prop-

For their part, Frank and Stella have restored the garage, widened the driveway, and added a gate. They plan to do further remodeling and restoration in the future. After all, it's not just Blandings' Dream House, it's their dream house too.

Sacramento County Board of Supervisors Approves Comprehensive Homelessness Reduction Initiatives

Homelessness is an issue plaguing virtually every community in Sacramento County; including right here in Hollywood Park. To address this comprehensively, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved four initiatives to reduce homelessness with the intent to: I. Improve the family homelessness sheltering system;

- 2. Support the strategic use of transitional housing;
- 3. Establish a low-barrier Full Service Rehousing Shelter, and;
- 4. Implement a new supportive Rehousing program that will employ intensive case management and Rehousing supports in conjunction with dedicated Public Housing Authority housing resources.

County Initiative #I will redesign the Family Homelessness Response and Shelter System to require family shelters to prioritize unsheltered families, make entry easier for families, mandate acceptance of families for housing services, and exit most families to permanent housing within 45 days. The proposed system would simplify access to shelter entry and maximize bed utilization.

County Initiative #2 will preserve the already successful Mather Community Campus (MCC) Residential and Employment Program on the former Mather Air Force Base campus. The County will provide funding to continue transitional housing and employment training and placement programs at MCC for 183 single adults experiencing homelessness when federal funding is discontinued on September 30, 2017.

County Initiative #3, a Full Service Rehousing Shelter, will serve those with the highest barriers to traditional services and shelter. Under this plan, the County will fund a local provider to open a 24-hour, low-barrier Full Service Rehousing Shelter designed to shelter and rapidly re-house persons who are difficult to serve in traditional shelters or services. Stable exit will be the primary objective of comprehensive on-site case management, including mental health services and drug and alcohol dependency programs.

County Initiative #4, the Flexible Supportive Rehousing Program, will employ an approach to target "frequent utilizers" of county services, traditionally the highest cost recipients of services, and the most difficult to serve. The Program would provide a highly flexible solution, employing proactive engagement, "whatever it takes services", and ongoing housing subsidies to engage and stably re-house this target population. Without the stability of housing, these individuals will likely never receive the services they need and remain homeless indefinitely. The report approved by the Board provided a road map to reducing homelessness, including milestones and time frames. Further discussions will take place during the Board's budget

I commend my Board colleagues, County staff, and numerous community based organizations for taking on this comprehensive approach to tackling the sad state of homelessness in Sacramento County, where lives are literally at stake. Moving forward I expect to see assurances that this large public investment is working. Bottom line is that we cannot keep doing business as usual.


If you missed the annual Harvest Hollywood Park event


