With summer right around the corner, we will already be half-way through 2018!

As the former Vice President and new President of your Hollywood Park Neighborhood Association, I have had the privilege of working with my fellow board members and dedicated neighbors on issues affecting our community over the

One of the biggest issues in Hollywood Park this year was the unfortunate tragedy that occured on Freeport Blvd as two pedestrians were struck by a motorist at a location where an

past year and a half.

existing crosswalk had been removed by City officials just two months earlier. I witnessed an entire community come together to voice their concerns to the City. Rest assured, HPNA, along with the greater surrounding community will continue to work with the City to find short-term and long-term solutions pedestrian (and cyclist) safety on our neighborhood roads. Changes have already started to happen as P and Q between 9th and 15th streets and 10th between I and Q streets have been retrofitted with "protected bike lanes" designed to provide a buffer to cyclists between crosswalks and parked vehicles (instead of flowing motorist traffic).

In addition the Del Rio Trail project is a 4.5-mile pedestrian and cyclist pathway connecting I-5 at Sutterville to I-5 at Cosumnes River Blvd is anticipated to begin construction in 2020 and to be completed by 2021.

As with all community issues, the

input of all neighbors is highly encouraged and much appreciated. Come attend an HPNA board meeting (held the 2nd Monday of every month from 6:30-8:00 pm), volunteer for any of our HPNA

committees (the business and business membership committee could really use a few helping hands), and attend some of our fantastic community events (the upcoming 4th of July parade). Most importantly, 2018 is an important year for elections as new governor will be elected and several City official seats are up for re-election. Please be sure to have your voice heard and vote. It's easier than ever this year. More details can be found on the next page.





Neighbors Engage in Traffic Safety Advocacy for Freeport Blvd

On May 2, the first meeting of the Freeport Boulevard Safe Routes to School Workgroup took place. About 12 neighbors from Hollywood Park and South Land Park joined City of Sacramento officials to talk about how to make pedestrians and cyclists safer when traveling around the Freeport Boulevard corridor that links the two neighborhoods. The majority of the meeting was spent discussing the goal of the workgroup, including what the geographic scope should be and whether to focus on certain groups that walk or bike, such as school-aged children. Neighbors also proposed broadening the goal of the workgroup beyond safety, to include the walkability and livability of our neighborhoods and the business corridor on Freeport Blvd.

Jennifer Donlon Wyant, Active Transportation Program Specialist for the Department of Public Works, presented some information about the new outreach and education programs for reducing collisions that the City will be rolling out through the Vision Zero project this summer. These ideas could be adapted to fit the outreach and education needs of Hollywood Park and SLP residents for a more targeted campaign. Azia Cherry from Jay Schenirer's office and Alex Zucco from Vice Mayor Steve Hansen's office shared information on some community improvement grants that the workgroup could apply for to create a project related to traffic safety.

The participants agreed to meet on a monthly basis and continue discussion of possible actions to improve traffic safety on Freeport Blvd and neighboring streets. The goal is to get started now, without waiting for City funding approval for major infrastructure investments. We are always thinking about traffic and how to get around more safely – on foot, bike, and car.

We are taking the lead in the City on stronger enforcement, education, and better engineering of streets for all especially in the Hollywood Park/ Freeport Boulevard area. For every speed bump and hump temporarily slowing traffic, there's a car accelerating to get to the next stop sign. What are other ways other than traffic cops at every corner, to encourage drivers to proceed with caution through intersections, keeping an eye out for pedestrians, and generally slowing down? How do we encourage drivers, bicyclists, and pedestrians to be attentive and present on the road/sidewalk? I hope that in the next months we can continue to come together to discuss how to solve these problems. Traffic data isn't supporting stop signs in some of our most challenging intersections, which makes it hard for

us to ask for funding over areas where the traffic and collision data more than supports stop signs, crosswalk signals, and more. But that doesn't mean I'll stop working with you to develop solutions to slowing down cars and making it safer to bike and walk in the neighborhood and on the major arterial streets.

Finally, Hollywood Park has great locally-owned businesses.

From Hollywood Hardware to J Crawford's Books, to Panama Pottery to Land Park Ski and Sport to the newest Star KTV opening soon—we have so many great small businesses. While there are many parts of Freeport, 24th, and Fruitridge that are ripe for new buildings and facelifts, these smaller businesses are more likely to thrive if our neighborhoods support them over larger chains. As others have written about in this newsletter, a business association or district could strengthen our small businesses and support diverse and vibrant commercial corridors. We will continue to support our small businesses and hope you do the same!

Thanks to all of you who have shared your enthusiasm (and your concerns) for Hollywood Park and what makes it so special. Let's work together to make it even better.

Freeport Boulevard Business Walk

On April 28th, Councilmembers Jay Schenirer, Vice Mayor Steve Hansen and County Supervisor Patrick Kennedy met with residents from Land Park, South Land Park, Carleton Tract, and Hollywood Park to visit with some of the major businesses along Freeport Boulevard. The purpose of this walk was to find out if businesses on both sides of Freeport Boulevard would be interested in establishing a PBID. The group visited many major businesses and a few smaller ones including but not limited to Mahoroba Japanese Bakery, Raley's, Shift Change, Oto's, Star KTV Lounge, Jade Fountain, Pocket Club, Hollywood Hardware, and J. Crawford's Book Store. What's a PBID? According to the City of Sacramento's website, a PBID or

Property and Business Improvement District is "... a financing mechanism where property owners enter into a special assessment district to improve their commercial districts" (https://bit.ly/2wZVj3b). Another way to say that is that businesses in a certain area such as Del Paso Boulevard or Midtown put money into a special account and then spend it to make shopping in that area more attractive. The ways that businesses pay for PBIDs and the things they do with their money are as varied as the businesses supporting them. In many instances, PBIDs will contribute funding to community events in their neighborhood and work with local governments to make the areas around them cleaner and safer. In some cases, they work with Regional Transit to improve the appearance of bus stops or the frequency with which buses stop

in that area. In areas where there are large or growing populations of individuals and families experiencing homelessness, PBIDs often invest in private security to dissuade noncustomers from hanging out near their businesses.

To pay for these improvements, some businesses increase the cost of their goods or services. Others add an additional tax to the total cost of whatever people purchase from them.

Is Freeport Boulevard Getting a PBID?

Yes/No/Maybe...It's complicated. At the end of the walk on April 28th, there was not a clear answer as to whether it would make sense for Freeport Boulevard to establish a PBID. For the time being, Councilmember Schenirer is planning to survey all business owners on Freeport, and host a larger dialogue in October. In order to establish a PBID,

property owners (not tenants) must vote to pay an assessment - and that vote must win the support of over 50 percent of the business owners within the defined geographic area. While there are strong potential benefits to be gained from a PBID, such as more focus on improving traffic conditions, there are inherent issues around the process. Many of the businesses, for instance, are small which may mean that the they don't get a vote equal to the larger businesses. There are administrative needs for running a PBID which means at least one staff person and potentially an office for him or her. Funding that position or positions increases the amount of money needed. If a PBID is established, there will be a direct impact on the surrounding neighborhoods and, as such, there is a strong incentive to get involved.

Neighbor Spotlight: JillMarie Milholm


In 1997, a young couple, pregnant with their first child, sought refuge from the hurry and high rent of midtown. Twenty-one years and three kids later, the couple has come to own the home they initially rented in Carleton Tract, a little neighborhood next to a big park.

Adorned with a little free library and an assortment of small trees and shrubs, the Milholm's front yard is quaint and inviting in a way that's hard to explain - one just wants to be there. JillMarie, the family's matriarch radiates a similar comforting presence that draws people in. As such, it's no surprise that she spends her days playing outside and adventuring around the city with our littlest neighbors. For the last 9 years, JillMarie has spent weekdays caring for neighborhood children while their parents are at work. By her estimation, she has been in the lives of nearly 25 kids in addition to her own and she's giving no indication of stopping. Unable to suppress a smile, JillMarie talks about loving her job because she and the kids get to spend so much time outside. Without academic parameters or strict structure, Milholm's childcare is best summed up by the notion that they "...totally adventure" to the park or the zoo or just around the neighborhood. In addition to the fun time outside, the children in JillMarie's care benefit from the kind of bonds that can only form when sharing toys and experiences.

The flipside of that coin is that Milholm's own children have had to learn to share their mother – a hard but, she feels, ultimately positive experience. The other hard part of this job is that there are more children in need of care than she can take; it's a little heart wrenching to turn away parents who need help. In an economy defined by doing more with less or less with less, however, it's refreshing to know that she would prefer to maintain the integrity of her establishment than maximize her profit margin.

Talking with JillMarie about her work led naturally to a conversation about the neighborhood, which has faced some challenges. When her family arrived, the street on which she lives was largely rental properties and transitional

housing for people with drug problems and developmental delays. Over the past two decades, however, the composition of her street, much like the neighborhood more broadly has changed. Most residences whether rented or owned are home to families and young people who came for low cost housing and stayed because of the vibrant community spirit in which neighbors become friends.

Like JillMarie, each of us is a building block in the construction of the neighborhood we call home. The neighbor spotlight allows us to peek into the lives of the people we pass every day and to define our community.
